MYSTERY TERM

- The active player draws a card and **without looking at it**, places it leaning against their easel so team mates can see the terms
- The mystery terms are labelled A to C on each card
 - **Blue** for Unit 1
 - **Pink** for Unit 2
 - **Green** for Unit 3
- Options for play:
 - Use cards from only one of the units
 - Mix cards from the three units together to review for the Final Exam

CLUE SELECTION

- Without communicating with each other and without showing it to anyone, each team mate writes one clue on their easel. The clue must be composed of a single word.

COMPARING CLUES

- Once all team mates have written their clues, the active player closes their eyes.
- Team mates turn their easels around to compare their clue with the other players.
- All identical or invalid clues are cancelled. To cancel a clue, simply turn the easel back around

GUESS

- The active player opens their eyes and tries to guess the mystery term with the help of the remaining clues; they are only allowed **one guess**.
 - Correct Guess: team scores a point
 - Incorrect guess: no point is awarded
- Return the card to the bottom of the deck and erase the easels

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CLUE SELECTION: RULES

- Note: a digit, a number, an acronym, or a special character are allowed.
 - Example: 23 is allowed to help someone guess chromosome, just like PMAT can be used as a clue for mitosis
- Invalid clues:
 - The Mystery word but written differently. Example: mRNA is not allowed as a clue for RNA
 - The Mystery word written in a foreign language.
 - A word from the same family as the Mystery word. Example: carb is not allowed if the word is carbohydrate.
 - Slang. Example: flow/lettuce is not allowed as a clue for trait.
 - A word phonetically identical to the Mystery word, but the meaning of which is different. Example: sell is not allowed as a clue for cell

COMPARING CLUES: RULES

- Identical clues include:
 - Variants from the same word family. Example: genetic and genetically
 - Variants of the same word: plurals, gender differentiations, and spelling mistakes don't count as actual differences

TEAMS OF THREE

- Each team mate uses two easels to provide two different clues for the active player
- Clues are still compared and identical clues are eliminated
